I advise those whose professors require the 2014 but still allow the use of 2013 to make sure to have acquaintances in class to compare when numbers are assigned from the exercises at the end of the chapters. In fact, take pictures of a friend's exercise numbers because some questions have been switched around. Also, please take into account the tax changes
